Mr Neluvhalani said it was important for municipalities to choose appropriate EPWP infrastructure projects that will create optimum employment and draw significant number of the unemployed into the Programme.

Other managers who made presentations included Mr Hlamalang Come, Mr Lungisani Dladla, Ms Sanny Maluleka, Mr Tshifhiwa Nkhumeleni and Dr Mapule Mkhatshwa-Ngwenya.

While Mr Come's presentation focuses on work opportunities creation in the Environment and Culture sector, Ms Maluleka made an extensive presentation on the Social sector. Dr Mkhatshwa-Ngwenya's presentation encouraged municipalities to monitor and evaluate their EPWP projects.

Municipal officials who attended the virtual workshop were allowed to ask questions on each presentation. The EPWP Virtual Learning Programme was facilitated by EPWP Programme Management unit.

EPWP participants are deployed to hotspots such as taxi ranks, social grant pay-points, shopping centres and other crowded areas to sanitize and ensure that community members adhere to social distancing.

He pointed out that in the implementation of the project, municipality was working with various stakeholders including the local police, departments of Health, Social Development as well as the Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs.

"We are also pleased with the positive engagement that the public is having with the participants and the work they do," Mostert said. The municipality currently has 12 EPWP participants who are working in this project. Most of the participants are young people and seven of them are women. They earn a daily wage of R100 and work eight hours a day for a maximum of 23 days a month.
